#### A NOTE FROM FATHER

**Dear Parishioners,** Next week, we start Holy Week. In this last week of Lent, we should 'double-down' on prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Let the Lord remove from our hearts all bitterness, anger, fear, envy, hatred, dissension, and discord. Let Him help open our hearts to His truth and love, that we may prepare to receive Him again with joy and gratitude.

Some have asked why the Easter Vigil is scheduled for **8:45 pm** on April 20th. The Easter vigil is the "Mother of all vigils" according to the Roman Missal. The Church gathers at night, ie, after sundown, in prayer to hear the story of salvation and anticipation of the Lord's Resurrection. We wait, like the virgins of old did for the Bridegroom, with lighted lamp. Because of the character of it being at night, the Church stresses we need to wait until after sundown, which this year is after 8:30 pm. It is a little later this year as Easter is 3 full weeks later than last year.

Last week was the 14th anniversary of the death of St. John Paul II. His reliance on Divine Mercy and the Blessed Mother was powerful, and he remains perhaps the strongest witness of a life dedicated to Christ and the Blessed Mother than certainly I have ever known. His writings, especially on the Eucharist, rosary,

mercy, and the theology of the body form the backbone of my understanding of the Catholic faith and my task as your pastor. I invite you to continue to ask his intercession for our parishes and school, as we strive to live the new evangelization that he and the other recent popes have proclaimed and invited. This new evangelization in a nutshell is summarized in our AFC mission statement: disciples guiding disciples!

#### **GROWING TOGETHER IN A STEWARDSHIP**

Contemplatio Josef Pieper once stated that artists teach us how to see the world in a new way, with a gaze of love. This is the perhaps a great definition Contemplation. "I gazed upon you in your of sanctuary, beholding your glory and your strength" (Psalm 63:2). When we contemplate the scriptures in Lectio Divina, we gaze with Love the Lord who speaks to us. The French priest and patron St. John Vianney, of all priests, recounts a conversation with an old man who was found daily in Eucharistic Adoration in front of the Tabernacle. St. John Vianney asked what he does when he kneels before the Eucharistic Lord. The old man responded, "I look at God and he looks at me, and that is enough". This man only needed to be in the presence of the Beloved. St. Teresa Avila described the experience of contemplation as brief initially, but over time the experience is elongated with perseverance in prayer and the moral life. Contemplation is an experience of presence-not about what we say or do, action is irrelevant. It is a response to the Psalm's invitation: "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10).

To review, Lectio/meditatio/oratio is the work of obtaining water from a well; but contemplatio is more the patient reception of a gentle rain from heaven.

#### TO RAISE A SAINT

My name is Jennifer Schmidt and my husband Colby and I have three daughters. Brooklyn is 10. Rosie is 6 and Adalyn is 2. When Brooklyn was in preschool, we started looking at our options for primary school. We were renting our home at the time and were open to moving to a new community for the "right school."

Because she was our first kiddo, I wanted everything to be perfect. We looked at a variety of schools from Henderson to Janesville. Some schools were public, some were charter schools and some were Christian. After touring (more schools than necessary) we decided on three major criteria.

The Pledge of Allegiance must be recited daily

- The class size must be small
- We wanted faith based learning to reinforce what we were teaching at home.

It seems silly looking back because today I would reverse the order of this criteria.

As a Mom, my goal is to raise happy kids. My goal is to have them be faithful adults and ultimately, I'd like to raise a Saint.

Since there isn't a handbook titled, "How to raise a Saint" Colby and I are just winging it. We attend mass (just about) every week, expose the kids to volunteer opportunities, and meet with a Small group bible study monthly. Our bible study began during Lent about three years ago following a visit from Deacon Ralph and has truly changed our lives. The biggest change we have made is sending the kids to John Ireland School. Looking back it is pretty sweet how we ended up here.

A friend of mine from work simply said, "Have you heard of John Ireland?" He did not push or boast about how wonderful of a school it is. He did not mention that his children were alumni. It was very natural and casual. Just a mention, a sweet invitation and that was it. I often wonder if more folks would simply mention John Ireland, simply invite, how many more seats would be filled and how many more kids would benefit from the positivity of the school.

After the initial invitation, Fast- forward a few weeks. Finally, I brought the kids to Mass. Colby was working. I was running solo. I was so nervous because I grew up in an Evangelical Lutheran Church community and wasn't familiar with the Catholic order of service. For almost ten years Colby went to Catholic mass and I attended the Lutheran service. We would flip a coin to see who "got to bring the kids."

That Sunday, My kids were the loudest, wildest, craziest kids in the whole church. I swear they ganged up on me. They were so naughty, I was sure we could not come back. That's when the Holy Spirit stepped in. He stepped in as the form of another parent. He saw my struggle. He welcomed us. He gave me a quick run-down on where the bathrooms were located and that there were donuts in the social hall following Mass. He invited us back. Most importantly, He invited us back.

Since that day, I realized what was missing from all of the other schools and church communities we visited. Here we were wanted. I challenge you to welcome, introduce and invite back families you don't recognize. It really makes all the difference.

On Brooklyn's first day of Kindergarten, I felt like I was throwing her in to the Lion's den. She was a quiet kid and I was scared for her. Throughout the day, I received pictures via text and saw her smile on Social media. I exhaled but did not realize the family we gained. I did not realize that the other families in the school would become like her aunts and uncles, her peers more like cousins. I did not realize the teachers were like sweet arandmothers encouraging everything from numbers and letter as well as encouraging her Faith. Her teachers led by example saying the rosary daily. She saw her teachers pray for us and our well-being as a family. Her teachers introduced me to the RICA program and helped me become in full communion with the Catholic faith. They gently led our family to unity. One faith, one religion. While studying with the RICA program I came to know a better understanding of my own faith and as a result, I am a better mother.

Obviously, committing to a Catholic education has its challenges. For our family, it is harder both financially and requires more volunteer hours than public education. Financially, it isn't a 7 year commitment. It isn't 7 years of tuition times the number of children we are blessed with. For us, it is giving to the school and scholarship program even after our kids are grown. It is prayers for the wellbeing of the school and staff. It is doing all that we can do to keep the school, our school, John Ireland successful. We won't offer our time, finances or prayers based on a requirement. Supporting John Ireland isn't a "Pass go" or "get to Heaven free" card. It is a Thank you. It is a Thank you to John Ireland for helping me to keep my kids humble. It's a thank you for teaching them how to be the best human they can possibly be. It is a thank you for helping me be the best mom I can be. I know Colby and I cannot do this alone, but together we can raise a saint. ~ Jennifer Schmidt
