#### **Dear Parishioners**,

Our sympathy to the family of George Klocow. May his soul, and the souls of all the faithful departed, rest in peace.

Some have asked about why I do not use the pall for cremation funerals. The answer is that the Church has clarified this in recent years, stating that the pall is omitted during funeral Masses with cremation remains. The explanation of it is simple: the pall is a reminder that the person (body and soul) was baptized, and when the body is not present as in the case of cremation, there is nothing to honor. Also changed during the funeral rites are any reference to the body itself, so in the graveside service, I would not refer to the burial of the body, but rather cremation remains. If you have questions, please let me know.

(On a related note, please see elsewhere in this bulletin the message and accompanying regulations re: maintenance issues at Calvary Cemetery.)

As secretary of Calvary Cemetery, one of my duties is to oversee the upkeep and maintenance of the cemetery grounds. Our caretaker, Tom Janni, has the huge task of mowing and weed whipping around the monuments and markers of our loved ones in a timely manner. While striving to be sensitive to those who are grieving, there is a growing problem with grave décor items that slows down the maintenance pro0cess that needs to be addressed. These items can be described as anything that has been pushed into the ground by the monument, marker or grave (including plant stands, solar lights, shepherd hooks, artificial or real flowers). I ask that you review the regulations enclosed below regarding decorations and take the necessary steps to comply. Please inform family and friends who are not parishioners as well. If you have questions or concerns, please call me at 931-6215. Thank you for your time and attention to this concern.

# From the Calvary Cemetery Rules and Regulations:

#### LANDSCAPING, PLANTING, AND FLORAL REGULATIONS

- 1. No trees, shrubbery, plants or flowers shall be planted in or transplanted into the Cemetery for decorative, memorial or any other purposes whatsoever, except by the cemetery management. Any of the above so planted will be removed by the cemetery caretaker.
- 2. Small bronze vases are permitted, but these must be set in cement at the same time as the marker. The cement collar will also extend three (3) inches around the base of the vase and will be part of the marker foundation. One vase will be allowed for individual markers and two for double markers. Vases may be used around monuments also.
- 3. Vases, urns, flower pots, plants, boxes, glass jars, cans, etc. will not be permitted on lots or graves, except that these or other appropriate decorations may be placed on lots or graves, (but not set into the ground), for Memorial Day or for such special occasions as may be designated by the cemetery management. However, all such containers and all other decorations must be removed within ten (10) days following Memorial Day or other designated occasions, after which the cemetery caretaker will dispose of all those remaining except all so-called permanent type urns or plant holders which must be incorporated within the wash of the monument or marker.
- 4. A three (3) day limit after each burial when all bouquets, decorations, etc. shall be removed from the grave.
- 5. Local cemetery management will not be liable for floral pieces, baskets, misplaced or broken flower vases or flag standards or other forms of memorials or decorations.
- 6. The cemetery management/caretaker will remove all floral designs, flowers (natural or artificial), or decorations of any kind from the cemetery grounds as soon as, in their judgment, these plantings and arrangements have become unsightly, dangerous, detrimental, or do not conform to the regulations.
- 7. No objects under 3/8" in diameter are to be placed in the ground.

From time to time, I've been given the opportunity to submit something to <u>"The Ledger"</u> for their "Light of the Way" column. The following is one that I submitted for their current issue. D.S.

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, and among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. Does this sound familiar? It should. It's straight from our Declaration of Independence. The founding of our country is a history rich in stories about vision, courage, sacrifice, and genius. Our country was truly blessed by God when it came into being. Our founders had the wisdom to establish in the Bill of Rights basic freedoms. They intended to protect these freedoms for posterity by having leaders in our country take an oath to preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States of America.

One of my favorite quotes from a founding father is when Patrick Henry said, "I may not agree with what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it." Oh how we could use such leadership today. It seems the standard practice these days is to criticize and shout down those who are saying something that we disagree with. We should always be ready to listen. As long as our faith is strong and our conscience is well formed, words will not hurt us. Many times we are so timid that we let groups speak for us regardless of which side of an issue we are on. Our founders created a form of government that maximized our rights as individuals to speak our minds. Freedom of speech and freedom of religious expression are protected in our First Amendment to the Constitution. These wonderful freedoms are at the core of our system of self-government.

We have some concerns. Along with this freedom comes a responsibility to protect it. Today, some are trying to redefine freedom of religion because they don't want to see it practiced outside of church walls or other religious institutions. They are claiming that any religious expression in the public arena is inappropriate and offensive. They are wrong. Let me say that again. They are wrong! Religious expression and free speech in the public arena is exactly what the First Amendment is intended to protect. These rights belong to individual people and not to any religious

organization. As individuals, we must exercise these freedoms openly in the public arena and resist any and all efforts to limit them or confine them only to particular places of worship."
